# Let's Go! Calming Traffic and Using Mass Transit

Neighbors, the opportunities to cultivate our little patch of Austin continue to grow. We face challenges to reach consensus among ourselves and to connect our common goals to the city at large. Two meetings this month exemplify these opportunities and challenges. At the meeting sponsored by the City Public Works Department on Thursday, July 8, we began a process for calming traffic in our neighborhood. At our next Zilker Neighborhood Association meeting on Monday, July 26, Capital Metro representatives will give us information regarding their upcoming plans for expanding the mass transit system in Austin. To include all citizens in the decisions, Capital Metro is seeking citizen input through their "Your Opinion Counts" outreach program. Come to the neighborhood meeting, and let Capital Metro know what you want and don't want in the mass transit system in the next millennium.

#### Traffic Calming

At the July 8 meeting, folks showed a good deal of confusion about what the traffic calming program is. It isn't a sidewalk program or a stop sign program or a speed limit program or a police patrol program All these programs continue on their own terms. The bonds we passed last year did contain new money for sidewalks, but that's a separate program

The traffic calming program is one of the dividends to neighborhoods of our humming economy. Developed over a dozen years ago, it was put on the shelf when the land speculation bubble burst and the economy deflated. Now that business is booming and tax revenues are up, the city council has budgeted money to this program.

As more people move into our city, vehicular traffic on our streets has increased. We've seen that on South Lamar, Barton Springs Road and the inner streets as drivers cut through our neighborhood. This additional traffic, compounded by speeding cars, has become a danger to our children, our friends, our pets, our wildlife and our peace of mind. They make us fear to walk or ride our bikes. So we've complained. We've asked the city to protect our neighborhood, and the City Council has responded. The goals of the traffic calming program are very simple: to slow down traffic inside the neighborhood and to

#### TOWN LAKE PARK MOVING FORWARD

The Town Lake Comprehensive Plan, adopted by the City of Austin in 1989, called for the creation of a "cultural park" at Auditorium Shores in the area surrounding Palmer Auditorium. Ten years later, due in large measure to the efforts of many neighborhood and community volunteers, we are beginning to see our vision become reality. The bond propositions passed last November authorized the City of Austin to lease Palmer Auditorium to performing arts groups, build a new community events center and parking garage, and make needed park improvements. Since then, stakeholders representing the arts community, the users of Palmer Auditorium and the Coliseum, park advocates and neighborhood representatives have worked together to develop a comprehensive master plan for Town Lake Park.

The master plan calls for the new buildings clustered around Palmer Auditorium to maximize access to the parking garage. This allows the western portion of the site to be left as green space spreading from Barton Springs Road to the lake front, with Riverside Drive removed. The park will include picnic facilities, sculpture areas, concessions, fountains and water features, educational exhibits, and open play areas. This plan has been endorsed by all the involved stakeholder groups.

The master plan has much community support, but there are several issues in question. The closing of Riverside Drive, the amount of concessions to be allowed in the park and the funding schedule for park improvements will be decided by the Austin City Council on Thursday, July 29. The Zilker Neighborhood Association executive committee urges all interested Zilker residents to attend the City Council meeting to give their opinions when the master plan of Town Lake Park will be presented.

The ZNA executive committee would like to thank the many neighborhood volunteers who participated in the park design process, particularly Kaye Trybus, ZNA vice president. She has given many hours of service as a member of the stakeholder's committee.

"There is still much to be done, but I believe Town Lake Park will be 'the crown jewel' of Austin", states Kaye. "The park will be enjoyed by Austin citizens and its visitors for many years to come."

#### LOVE's Story

Last summer, my neighbor and I planted a flower garden in a plot of dirt that sets between our two driveways. It's a struggling little garden filled with salvia, columbines, shasta daisies and a plant my mother calls "lives forever". Among the plants, I placed two stones. They weren't those "tumbled 'til they're smooth" river rocks with loving messages etched into them like the ones you find in those fancy gardening catalogues. They were just two common yard rocks. On one rock I wrote JOY & PEACE in block letters using some blue paint left over from a past unfinished project. I placed that rock in the back area of our tiny garden. On the second stone, which I set in front, I wrote LOVE. As primitive as they looked, the garden seemed to like those two rocks as well as my neighbor and I did.

It was not too long after that, I found myself sitting near my open window enjoying the twilight of the day. It was one of those days where time wasn't going anywhere and neither was I. Seemingly engrossed in their conversation, I noticed three teenagers walk pass my view Seconds later I heard a sharp thud, but my mind was elsewhere, so I thought little of the reason for the sound. Later that evening, when I went to my garden, I found LOVE had been broken in two. Split right in half. My guess is, due to the timing of the teens walking pass my yard, and the sound I heard at that time, one of the boys took it upon himself to break the rock in two.

I find myself often thinking about that young man. I wonder what message registered in his brain when he saw that simple little rock with the simple word LOVE crudely written on it. Whatever message it was, he had to make an immediate decision to reject the image, the memories and feelings appearing before him. Picking up another rock and raising it over his head, he threw that stone down with such a force that it snapped his target in half. I wonder, too, what his two friends thought of his deed. Were they, too, in silent agreement?

Surprisingly, I'm not angry with the young man. In truth, it was *only* a rock. But I do feel sorry for the lad. I would like to ask him why. Why was he was so afraid of LOVE? So afraid that he had to destroy the very evidence of its existence. I would like to ask him, had I written on that stone in block letters with blue paint the words, HATE or FEAR, would he have taken the *same* action?

With a sense of sadness, I took the two rocks, turned them over and put them in the back in the garden to hide behind the bushy growth of blooming columbines. The shame of their destruction would be seen only by my eyes. But then, just as suddenly, I changed my mind. I set the rocks back in their original position. So now, in this small garden, there are two stones which were once one. Broken apart by some unknown hand, now placed side by side, they still spell an even greater message. It is this: Yes, LOVE can be broken, but it can never truly be destroyed.

It sits back from the street right on the corner of Bluebonnet and South Lamar. But recently the owners put a sign (LARGE, orange) right in front, and it reads "French Bakery". How much easier can it get?


The first time I entered La French, I was impressed with the light airy feeling that filled the dining room. With windows across one wall and the sunshine splashing across the lovely wood tables and chairs, the room had the warmth of a charming tea room. I found the service to be quick, friendly and delightful. I had a chance to practice my French, too, as the owners are from Cannes, France.

Then, of course, there are the cases filled with treats to delight the eye and tastebuds. Creamy cheese cakes, flaky croissants, beautiful hand-decorated cakes, cookies, Neapolitans (my favorite) and other yummy desserts line up side-by-side to tempt the tongue. If you want coffee with your pastry, there is cappuccino, cafe au lait and expresso available.

So you don't want to start off your day on a sweet note? La French also serves breakfast--and lunch. Two scrambled eggs on a croissant (remember this is a French bakery) with ham and cheese and coffee runs \$3.95. The owners have recently added omelets to their breakfast menu. For you late risers, breakfast is served until 10:30 a.m. Lunch offers a fine selection of sandwiches, quiches, salads, and soups.

Drop in to La French Bakery & Cafe some morning, say "Bon jour!", and taste a bit of heaven. What a way to start a day!

encourage through-traffic to stay on the arterial streets. This is done by installing a variety of structures on neighborhood streets. Some force drivers to slow down, and some restrict entry to certain streets. The process is fair and inclusive.

Recently, the city staff mailed invitations to attend a public meeting at the Kinney Avenue Baptist Church on Thursday, July 8 to every resident, property owner and business owner in the area. Included in the invitation was a survey which requested information regarding traffic problem areas in our neighborhood. Almost one hundred Zilker residents packed the room that night.. With city staff support, a working group of twenty-one people—all volunteers—was chosen to meet monthly over the next six months to develop a traffic calming plan for our neighborhood. After the group determines the needs of the neighborhood, another public meeting will allow residents to give their opinions regarding the options. The neighborhood will then vote the plan up or down.

At our first public meeting, people spoke up with many different views. Some people gave enthusiastic support to the program. Some argued for or against particular devices. Some complained about particular streets. Some worried about slowing down fire trucks and ambulances. Some just didn't want anything done.

Doing nothing is an option, but not one I favor. As a member of the working group, I will be intent on producing a plan that accomplishes the goals—slowing and reducing traffic in the neighborhood—and can win the support of two thirds of our neighbors. I also hope to bring some beauty to our streets. The key to the success of this project will be for everyone to proceed with open minds and good will.

#### Capital Metro

The presentation and dialogue with Capital Metro at our Monday, July 26 meeting will give us another chance to affect change. Capital Metro has been working hard to transform itself. The new board began by putting its financial house in order. Then it hired new management. Now that new management is coming out to the neighborhoods to ask us what we want in our transit system.

The transit system has a big job. It must improve circulation in the city, reduce auto traffic (or stop its growth) and so reduce air pollution. The city as a whole will require light rail. Unfortunately, our neighborhood is not in any of the light rail plans.

So what can Zilker reasonably expect? I think our neighborhood should expect the same things that Capital Metro owes the city as a whole. Capital Metro should make it easy and convenient for us to travel to any part of the city. It should take cars off South Lamar and Barton Springs Road by carrying commuters who live in the suburbs. And it should clear our air. To better connect us with the city, Capital Metro should give us more routes, frequent service and better information. We have routes connecting us to the south, the east and the northeast. We should have a route

going straight up Lamar running ten minutes or less. Schedules posted at every stop would be just a first step in providing better information to transit riders. To make travel more convenient

Capital Metro should make bus stops more accessible and more comfortable. We should be able to cross South Lamar easily and safely to reach any bus stop. Maybe bus lanes

should be put in the center of Lamar to reduce the crossing distance. To take traffic off the arterials, Capital Metro should establish better service to the 'burbs. It may be galling to

provide service to those who moved outside the inner-city to pursue the sprawl life, but keeping them in their cars punishes us more than it does them

To clear our air, Capital Metro should buy only nonpolluting vehicles. Natural gas is a good fuel. Even better, Capital Metro could electrify the routes along South Lamar.

These are just a few ideas. We encourage you to bring your ideas to the ZNA general meeting on Monday, July 26. Let Capital Metro know what you think!
