Festival is Music to Zilker's Ears

The Austin City Limits Music Festival held last fall was a success, thanks to the cooperative efforts of the promoter, the City Parks department, Capital Metro, and surrounding neighborhood associations.

"Everyone worked together to prevent or manage many of the problems that have occurred at earlier events in Zilker park," said Jeff Jack, former president of the Zilker Neighborhood Assocation (ZNA). "In general, the neighborhoods were pleased with the efforts made to address neighborhood concerns."

The ZNA executive committee recommendations presented by Jeff Jack at follow-up meetings in November were positively received and appreciated. The list of ZNA suggestions for improvement dealt mostly with traffic management. 
"We are hopeful that the promoter's and City's response

to neighborhood concerns can be extended to other venues and larger events," said Jack.

At follow-up meetings with the promoter and City Parks staff, Jack learned that:

ACL festival will cover only one weekend. The next ACL festival is planned for September 19-21.

Though they believe the event could grow, they do not intend to build it to the level of the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival.

These are some of the things that drew Allen and me to this area when we were looking for a place to settle in Austin. What is it you love about living here? What's missing for you? Are you concerned with protecting what we have in our changing city? Interested in enhancing our neighborhood community? Maybe it's time for you to get more involved in your neighborhood.

How can **you** participate?

Join the ZNA, or renew your membership. The more residents who join the neighborhood association, the better the neighborhood gets. Your annual dues of \$7 per person help support special projects and cover the organization's minimal operating costs.

Share your ideas and opinions, and stay informed. Participate in the Zilker e-mail list, at zilker@yahoogroups.com. Check the website, at http://members.tripod.com/znaweb/. Attend the ZNA quarterly meetings and/or the monthly executive committee meetings. Email or call executive committee members when you have comments or questions.

Volunteer for a standing committee or a special project. If you can commit to 4-6 hours a month, join a committee focused on S. Lamar development planning, zoning and code compliance, the website, neighborhood social activities, or membership.

Also consider joining with others

focused on the pedestrian safety/sidewalk problem on Kinney, help with fundraising for the historic Barton Springs Baptist Church cemetery, organize the *Zestival*, or propose a new project (for example: organize a babysitting co-op, an emergency telephone tree, Neighborhood Watch, a project with a neighborhood school, a gardener's group, or Neighborhood Academy classes for Zilker residents). We also need more help delivering the quarterly *Z-News*.

Take a leadership role by serving on the Executive Committee. It generally takes about 8-10 hours a month to fulfill the basic responsibilities of an executive committee member, including the regular monthly meeting. There is always more to be done, of course, when we have more time to give.

Right now these positions are open: Second Vice President, Co-Secretary, and Co-Chair of the Social Committee. We also need someone to represent our neighborhood at the Austin Police Department's Commander's Forum, a quarterly meeting.

The City may explore alternative sites for large events, to avoid closing Barton Springs Road so often. Many events formerly held in Zilker Park, such as the Bun Run, have been moved.

A different solution for the taxis will be implemented. Police issued 121 traffic tickets to taxis, mainly for stopping in

front of the east entry and dropping off passengers.

Planners will consider rerouting cars back to Lamar by way of Barton Springs Road instead of through the neighborhood.

They agreed to most of our requests for additional signs, indicating that larger signs would

Making Ourselves Heard

(But Not Too Loudly)


Last year the City of Austin formed an advisory committee to come up with a new noise ordinance, motivated primarily by the desire to resolve problems with live music venues in the downtown entertainment districts. Those problems received quite a bit of publicity, and most Austin residents would probably assume that the resulting ordinance applied only to a few streets downtown.

In fact, the city council has approved revisions that apply to the entire city. The provisions that regulate amplified sound in neighborhoods like Zilker and most of South Central Austin,

where small houses and apartment buildings are right next to or behind some of the best live music venues in town (at least we like them a lot), received very little attention as the ordinance was being drafted.

In January the South Central Coalition of neighborhoods, with the support of Austin Neighborhoods Council and the ZNA

executive committee, asked the city manager to make changes to the proposed ordinance that restricts the use of sound equipment in residential areas.




We suggested areas with multifamily zoning be included to protect residents of small apartment buildings from excessive noise, that the morning hours when amplified sound is prohibited be extended from 10 a.m. to noon, and that the allowable decibel level of 75 be reduced to 65, because hearing loss begins at 70 decibels.

The coalition also recommended the section providing for special-event permits be clarified, including a public hearing with notification of all property owners within 300 feet.

Finally, the coalition recommended a buffer zone around entertainment districts (where higher sound levels are allowed), just as the Airport Overlay Ordinance provides for a half-mile buffer zone around the noisiest parts of Bergstrom.

None of the neighborhood recommendations made it into the final ordinance.



Discover the Past in Your Own Backyard

After the Civil War ended in 1865, hundreds of former slaves from rural areas moved to Austin to join the few freed slaves already living in this part of Texas. Freed men and women came from surrounding plantations to Austin seeking work, assistance and family they'd been separated from during slavery.



Despite myriad challenges including vagrancy laws, substandard housing, and physical attacks, freedmen settled throughout Austin. They formed communities at the edges of town and developed social structures based upon churches and self-help organizations.

One such community, the Barton Springs freedmen town, existed in the neighborhood known today as Zilker. This part of Austin was the countryside then, but it didn't stop exslaves from beginning a town here in 1865. A historic church and cemetery on Goodrich Street are the only reminders of this important piece of Texas history.

Until recently the Barton Springs Baptist Church and Cemetery suffered from neglect and vandalism. Today, thanks to the perseverence of church member Emmett Watters and the help of some new Zilker neighbors, the Society of Friends, this special place is undergoing a facelift.

"On several occasions this winter, a group met to clear brush from the cemetery," said Lorraine Atherton, a ZNA member. "Thanks to Dave Draudt and the other Quakers who organized the cleanup, the cemetery is a lovely open space."

Volunteers are hoping to find a way to dispose of roofing material dumped on the site over the years. Future projects may include planting flowering shrubs along the back, replacing dead trees, installing fences, and planting flowerbeds. ZNA is seeking volunteers to help mow this spring and summer or to adopt part of the grounds to maintain. Other possible volunteer projects range from historical research to reconstruction of the church building.

ZNA is seeking donations of time and money to protect this unique site right in the heart of Zilker Neighborhood. Maria's Taco Xpress Granted Variance

In November, Maria Corbalan, owner of Taco XPress on South Lamar, applied to the City of Austin Board of Adjustment for a variance from a city regulation that would have required her to pave all the parking in front of her restaurant.

The ZNA Executive Committee supported the application, recognizing that although Taco Xpress has access to the required parking, it is unable to pave it because it is located within the right of way along South Lamar.

In this case, the city's retroactive application of paving requirements definitely created a hardship for the existing business. The Board of Adjustment agreed that there was a true hardship, within the Board's fairly narrow definition of the term, and granted the variance.



be placed in more locations in the neighborhoods.

Officials will clean up leftover trash where event patrons park in the neighborhoods.

The promoter will investigate selling tickets off site at either the state parking garages or at Waterloo Park to encourage the use of the shuttle service.

Improvements to Capital Metro's service are being addressed.

Officials estimated attendance for both days to be 70,000; actual sales of one- and two-day tickets were about 37,500.

Thanks to Jeff for serving as the neighborhood's festival monitor and for his thorough reporting on the event planning process. 


