
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Looking for Crime in Zilker

In response to numerous emails and conversations about home and car burglaries in the Zilker Neighborhood, the ZNA Executive Committee solicited volunteers and formed a crime subcommittee to look at the types of crimes, their location and frequency, and what could be done to reduce Zilker crime. The Austin Police Department keeps crime statistics, of course, but they are not necessarily focused on the area of our neighborhood. The best source of crime stats I could find was at SpotCrime.com. The SpotCrime Web site lists public crime reports by date, time, and type and displays them on a map.

Through SpotCrime, I was able to find Zilker data for the last eight months and organize it into reports on South Lamar and Barton Springs Road, separate from reports on the interior of the neighborhood. For both areas, burglaries of homes and businesses, burglaries of vehicles, theft, and assaults all seem to fluctuate month to month, but the overall trend shows that the rate of any of these types of crimes is relatively constant. There are some spikes (good and bad) at certain times. For a more detailed look, see the summary at www.main.org/znaweb/crime/. In the future, anyone can look at the Zilker Neighborhood area at SpotCrime.com and see how crime rates

compare to the last eight-month period.

The subcommittee has visited with APD, and Officer Dwayne Kinley has accepted our invitation to speak at the February 23 ZNA meeting. He will explain what we neighbors can do to reduce crime (including Neighborhood Watch), and he will answer questions. Also, APD has a statistician dedicated to the Southwest District, of which Zilker Neighborhood is a part. Whenever there is a hot spot, a special APD unit can be directed to the area for an investigative focus and to make their presence known. Hot spots are determined by citizen reports of crime or suspicions of crime, so it is important that we all report suspicious activity or persons by calling 311. These calls have their own special tracking code, which brings them to the attention of the APD statisticians who determine the hot spots. (If you see a crime in progress call 911, though, for an emergency response.)

Land Use and Zoning Update

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Chimney Swifts for Zilker by Kim McKnight

This spring, listen for high-pitched musical chip notes strung together into a rapid twitter. Then look up and try to find the "flying cigar." These are Chimney Swifts, and the Zilker neighborhood is about to become an even friendlier place for these little birds. The chimney of an old incinerator building adjacent to Zilker Elementary School is being retrofitted to provide a Chimney Swift roosting site. The project has been spearheaded by the

Friends of Zilker Neighborhood Park and the Urban Habitat Committee of Travis Audubon. We are grateful for the support of the Zilker Elementary School principal, Randall Thomson. This project has also received extensive support from Paul and Georgean Kyle of the Driftwood Wildlife Association, a Chimney Swift habitat. Why should I care about Chimney Swifts?

- Chimney Swifts eat nearly one third of their own weight in flying insect pests, such as mosquitoes, biting flies, and termites, every day.
- ♦ Chimney Swifts historically used large, hollow trees for nests and roosts. As the ancient forests were cut down, they learned to use chimneys and other built structures instead. Today, just like Purple Martins, Chimney Swifts rely almost entirely on human-built structures for their nest sites.
- Because they cannot perch like songbirds, Chimney Swifts must have deep shafts in which to raise




- their families and roost at night.
- Chimney Swifts are protected by State Wildlife Codes and federal law under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1916.
- ◆ Like all Neotropical migrants, Chimney Swifts are declining in numbers and need our assistance. Chimney Swifts winter in the Amazon Basin of Peru. They arrive in the continental United States in late March and are gone by early November.
- Like watching a beautiful sunset, the aesthetic value of observing Chimney Swifts' aerial acrobatics and interactions is a simple pleasure that nature has to offer.

Eight families had a happier holiday this past December through ZNA's Holiday Family Program. Over the last eleven years, ZNA has sponsored 63 families through holiday programs. That record of generosity reflects a fundamental part of our neighborhood's character.

"This holiday program is a real blessing to the families the ZNA sponsors," said Kaye Trybus, one of the holiday helpers. "Without the help of the Zilker Neighborhood Association, these families would not have much of a Christmas. So I am glad we can all pull together to help them."

Making the program work takes many hands and many hearts. Thank you to all the Zilker neighbors who donated money, toys, clothes, and household items last year. The program raises about \$2,000 a year, which is used to buy gifts and gift cards for the sponsored families. Last year, said Kaye, "With the money donated, we were even able to buy a bunkbed for one family. The kids were sleeping on the floor."

All the families had children that attended Zilker Elementary School. They are selected by the school counselor, who keeps track of families in need in the school community and helps them put together their wish lists. She always knows more families who need help than ZNA can

sponsor with our two-month fall campaign.

In anticipation of even greater needs during tough economic times, the ZNA executive committee asks that you remember the Holiday Family Program throughout the year. Zilker Neighborhood Association: Frequently Asked Questions

How often does ZNA meet? Quarterly, in February, April, July, and October, at Zilker Elementary School. The Executive Committee meets at 7 PM the first Monday of each month, usually at Artz Rib House.


Who does ZNA represent? Directly: The membership of our association, which is open only to residents within ZNA's boundaries. Indirectly: A larger cross-section through neighbor-to-neighbor discussions and circulation of more than 2800 newsletters.

How many members does ZNA have? As of November, 145 members have paid dues or will be eligible to vote as soon as they renew.

Is Zilker@yahoogroups.com the official list serve for ZNA? No, but the Yahoo group is a useful communication vehicle. It is open to all residents, whether they are ZNA members or not.

How many people belong to the Yahoo group? 515. How can I contact the association by e-mail? ZilkerNA@austin.rr.com.

How does the ZNA Executive Committee arrive at a position on an issue? The committee considers several factors in determining a position that is consistent with the sentiment of the neighborhood, beginning with the ZNA bylaws and including, depending on the issue, the ZNA neighborhood planning survey conducted in 2004, the City of Austin neighborhood planning survey conducted in 2005, *ZNews* surveys, input gathered from

discussions and resolutions adopted at our quarterly meetings, discussion on the list serve and email input from neighbors, and political consultation with board and commission members and City Council members.

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(Continued from page 1) capable of matching volunteers and tasks.

Steve Barnick, a former ZNA officer, is organizing a way to volunteer on your own block: "Neighbors, anyone in need of help getting their blue recycling cans to the street or wanting to volunteer to help those in need of assistance please contact Steve Barnick at ding_dong_slb@yahoo.com or leave a message at phone number 444-0674. Our goal will be to pair up folks in need with neighbors willing to help so that Zilker is the leader in recycling." Staying in touch with older neighbors is an important part of Neighborhood Watch programs, according to our police district representative (see page 4), and helping with weekly trash and recycling pickups is one of the most common icebreakers in that regard. It works both ways: you can help out your older neighbor once a week, and your stay-at-home neighbor can keep an eye on your home while you are away.

The benefits of volunteerism spread far beyond the neighborhood's boundaries, but ZNA can't survive without it. The purpose of ZNA is "to seek to improve the quality of life in the neighborhood in matters of land use, environmental protection, public services, consumer protection, preservation of the historic and unique character of the community; to provide support in other matters of neighborhood concern; and to promote and participate in the civic life of the city" (from the ZNA bylaws).

The association relies directly and entirely on neighbors who volunteer their time to research issues, craft recommendations, and represent our interests at city hall.

Over the last several years, most of that volunteer time has been consumed by zoning and land use issues. Now that the boom is over and we are facing tough economic times, we hope we can refocus on the charitable organizations and nonprofit efforts that are so important to Zilker's quality of life. To those of you who have been volunteering all these years, thank you for making Zilker such a neighborly place to live. This time of year, the ZNA treasurer usually gets a few questions about tax deductions and ZNA dona-





tions (see page 9 for other Frequently Asked Questions). Dues and donations paid directly to ZNA are not deductible on federal income tax returns. Although ZNA is a nonprofit, it primarily represents its members in governmental and political arenas and therefore is not eligible for charitable tax deductions. Most of the fundraising efforts that we support, however, have separate accounts administered through groups like the Austin Parks Foundation, which do have tax-exempt status. If you plan on making a donation to a ZNA program and would like that donation to be tax deductible, please ask about making the donation directly to a charitable organization, rather than ZNA.

Zilker Gets Out the Vote

In the November election, voter turnout for Zilker precinct 332 was 75%, 10 points above the citywide turnout of 65%. Precinct 462 (east of Kinney) also beat the average, with 67% turnout. The best news is that both precincts, which already had a high registration rate, increased their number of registered voters by more than 5% between the May and November elections in 2008. The two precincts combined had 4428 registered voters in November. Of the 3197 votes cast, the Obama-Biden ticket won 80% in Precinct 462 and 83% in Precinct 332.

Your next chance to vote will be in the City Council elections in May. Turnout for last year's city elections was abysmal: 19% in 332, 9% in 462, and only 10% citywide.

Twin Oaks Branch Library Delay: A revised construction schedule provided by the general contractor in January has moved the planned opening of the new branch library at Mary and S. Fifth from August to October 2009. The Library Department will closely monitor the performance of this contractor. Work expected in the upcoming weeks includes site work, concrete work, retention pond and irrigation piping, concrete sidewalks, structural steel corrections, steel roof decking installation, steel angle and metal plate connections for the wood trusses, and replacement of the rejected north retaining wall. *ci.austin.tx.us/library/cip.htm*

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
