Zilker Elementary Rainwater Harvesting and Urban Orchard

ON MARCH 3 the Zilker school community, in partnership with the larger Zilker neighborhood and beyond, will celebrate the recent rains and onset of spring with the installation of a small urban orchard on parts of the school's large front lawn. The Zilker Sustainability Committee, working with AISD, local businesses, and the non-

profit organization TreeFolks, has designed a rainwater catchment system that will irrigate the fruit and nut trees (granted to the school through TreeFolks urban orchard program) using gravity flow. The system, including a beautiful stainless steel tank that holds 2,500 gallons, will be eligible for a City of Austin rebate. The school planning group has designed the project so that there will continue to be plenty of open space in front of the school, while the community enjoys caring for the trees and sharing the seasonal fruits and nuts. A Message from ZNA Prez Andrew Elder

SITE PLANS HAVE BEEN PROPOSED for seven multifamily and mixed-use projects within a few blocks of Lamar Plaza, at South Lamar and Treadwell, with enough dwelling units to double the population of Zilker. Most are just as car-centric as any suburban development, partly because there are few options for their future residents besides a car. Sure, folks can walk short distances around South Lamar for restaurants, maybe bike if they brave the shifting bike lanes. But other than Treadwell and Lamar Square, stoplights are a rare commodity, leaving people to bolt (Continued on page 6)

A new drinking fountain was installed in Little Zilker Park the week of February 6, marking the completion of another park improvement coordinated by the Friends of Little Zilker. On city parkland adjacent to the new playscape at Zilker Elementary, the fountain was funded by both the Zilker PTA and ZNA's Rolling Stones parks fund.

In addition to the new fountain, the Rolling Stones fund has helped to build the running track, install irrigation systems, plant trees, and wire more efficient field lights. The most important

benefit, though, has been the establishment of the Friends of Little Zilker, which has brought together dozens of volunteers from the neighborhood and the school to plan and maintain our neighborhood park.



We are grateful to Joan Singh and John Estrada of the Austin Parks and Recreation Department for the decomposed granite to finish the project. Neighbor Gina Diehl devoted countless volunteer hours over the last two years to coordinating this and other projects for the Friends of Little Zilker. Tree mutilator strikes again. 

Crime Stats Show Good News

IT MAY BE A BIT disconcerting to use the term "good news" when referencing crime, but that's how recent crime statistics are looking here in Zilker. The 2011 crime statistics reflect a decrease not only nationally and in our city but also in our neighborhood.



In December, the FBI reported that violent and property crimes continue to drop despite tough economic times. In November, the Austin Police Department announced "we are currently experiencing a five year low in property crime in Region 4 (South Austin). We are certain this has to do with you the citizens who are reporting suspicious activity and helping us catch criminals." After reading several articles like these about the downward trend of crime, I was curious to see if the trend held for our neighborhood as well. I found that based on data on the SpotCrime Web site, crimes reported in Zilker decreased not only in 2011 but also in 2010 as compared to 2009.

There is always room for improving our Neighborhood Watch Program, but I echo the sentiment expressed by the representative from APD. I believe that neighbors watching out for neighbors, walking and biking our 'hood while wearing our bright yellow

ZNA Joins Kite Festival March 4

THANKS to the generosity of our Zilker neighbors in 2011, the Zilker Neighborhood Association is

pleased to be a sponsor of the 2012 Kite Festival at Zilker Park, promoting creativity and healthy homes for children in ZNA and across the city.



The festival's chief sponsors are the Exchange Club of Austin and the City of Austin. The Exchange Club created the event as a kite tournament in 1929, with a

mission to encourage creativity in children.

The national mission of the all-volunteer civic club is the prevention of child abuse. This year, the festival is supporting the Pebble Project of Communities in Schools. This program, in their own words, "believes that all children have a right to be safe, strong, and free." As Bunnie Twidwell of the Exchange Club put it, "These folks go out into the schools to teach children how to protect themselves, and inevitably they identify kids that need immediate help." Pebble suffered huge budget cuts last year, so the Exchange Club is hoping to help through the Kite Festival.

Zilker's donation is our way of supporting fun, family, and free community events in our most treasured park, while continuing to provide for all of Austin's children. (Continued from page 1) across unprotected lanes rather than walk the half mile to a light. Bus service has been declining, not increasing, and the coming rapid bus service actually removes stops along Lamar in order to speed up transit times for Oak Hill commuters. No rail will reach Zilker anytime soon, so what are the options for a car-free resident?

From inside the neighborhood, this means more of what we saw on Hether recently, where motorists treat residential streets like an extension of Lamar, endangering pedestrians and pets. Streets become less pedestrian friendly, not more, when there are more cars on them. ZNA's next course of action has to capture a combination of things:

- Push for more transportation options: more and better bike lanes, more and better sidewalks, more and better bus options. The current options don't cut it.
- Enforce the difference between commuter roads (S. Lamar) and residential streets: Hether is not supposed to be the fastest way to get from A to B, so it should be designed and used to put the priority on people rather than vehicles.
- Learn from current developments: the VMU strategy has brought density to the corridor, but is it bringing other benefits along with it? All the developers we talk to are rejecting the parking discounts and development bonuses that the city offers, in favor of "fully parked" projects. The current rules for affordability mean there are






some units that will be less expensive, but most are going to be \$1500 efficiencies. Will that bring kids to Zilker Elementary, or provide an affordable alternative to retirees, or allow artists and college students to live close to work and school? Other cities have been able to provide diverse housing options with new development, and Austin should strive for "community" more than just "density."

These issues of urban connectivity (bikes, sidewalks, roads, and housing) will be big topics at the ZNA general meeting on Feb. 27.

Recently I have been encouraging Zilker neighbors to take advantage of the city's latest program to address speeding in neighborhoods. Introduced in January, the Local Area Traffic Management program allows individuals to request remediation in specific locations. Only a limited number of applications will be accepted for this first wave, so we in Zilker should put our requests in the system immediately. While we're at it, we should also be setting our neighborhood priorities for capital improvements that we would like to see included in a November bond election.

There will be a LATM representative at our Feb. 27 meeting to help everyone learn more about the process and possible solutions. Any questions or requests that come up at the meeting will certainly have more weight if we have applications for trouble spots already on file. Visit the city Web site (austintexas.gov/department/local-area-traffic-management) to download the information packet.

And be sure you are registered to vote by March 5. See you at Zilker Elementary on Feb. 27.




