### The Future of Lamar Plaza, and Beyond

A Message from ZNA President Andrew Elder

Another major project is coming to South Lamar. Greystar plans to redevelop the iconic Lamar Plaza as a vertical mixed use (VMU) project, adding more than 400 apartments alongside businesses on the nine acres.

To promote neighborhood compatibility, a mix of single- and two-story apartments will front Treadwell and Dexter, with doorways facing the streets. The rest of the site will rise to a five-story peak at the southeast corner (where Suzi's is now). Ten percent of the housing units should be affordable at the 60% level. The Alamo Drafthouse will remain, and a small grocery and some restaurants and retail shops are also likely. Three parking garages will be hidden inside the commercial and residential buildings, holding nearly three times the current parking spaces. Access to the garages will be on Treadwell, and the driveways on Lamar will be reduced to one in the center of the block. There will be no vehicle access to the site from Dexter.

The new Alamo Plaza represents a major change to our neighborhood. Counting other nearby projects, more than 1000 new housing units are planned within a few blocks, but we may also lose several longtime local businesses. The designers have worked to minimize overflow parking and integrate the project with neighboring residences, but new traffic problems are certain at Treadwell and Lamar. The new projects on South Lamar are building on the VMU plan that ZNA submitted to the city a few years ago, and we hope they will deliver the expected benefits.

THREE RESOLUTIONS on city policies that will define the future direction of change in Zilker will be featured at ZNA's Oct. 24 meeting. These resolutions represent recommendations on how we elect our City Council, on the comprehensive planning process, and on commercial short-term rentals in residential areas. The Austin Neighborhoods Council (ANC) is asking its member organizations to vote on these resolutions at its Oct. 26 meeting, and so the ZNA executive committee is asking you to participate in the discussion at our Oct. 24 meeting. I hope you will join the debate on where we go from here.



#### Short-Term Rental Resolution

As reported in the July issue of *ZNews*, the Austin Planning Commission is working on a new ordinance to define and regulate short-term rentals (STR) in single-family residential areas. For many months now, ZNA vice president Steven McGuire has participated in a working group formed by the Planning Commission. Members of the working group representing various neighborhoods have concluded that the current recommendations for this ordinance are too restrictive for homeowners who rent their houses only occasionally (during SXSW, for instance) and too (Continued on page 6)




## Zilker PTA-BookPeople Fundraiser Nov. 12-19

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#### A Little TLC at Little Zilker Park

It's Official. This is Austin's worst drought ever. The past year has replaced the peak of the 1950s drought as the driest year in Central Texas, and long-range forecasts predict that the dry weather will continue through the winter.

In the spring of 2010, the Friends of Little Zilker Park celebrated the end of our two-year watering obligation for the trees we planted in 2008. All of those trees did well under the care of our watering and mulching teams, especially considering the brutal summers of 2008 and 2009. In 2010 we decided to keep a skeleton crew of volunteers together for supplemental watering once or twice a month, but as the drought has deepened, the need has gone far beyond "supplemental." Volunteers now provide the only water that most of the park and school campus receives, and even the established trees are suffering. The city parks staff has done a great job of keeping the Little Zilker irrigation system running, but they are stretched very thin.

So this fall's Little Zilker Park workday has a special urgency. The Friends of Little Zilker Park and the volunteer gardeners for Zilker Elementary need your help to preserve the trees and gardens that hundreds of children and neighbors have planted over the last 10 years. If you can't attend the workday on October 29, please sign up to help out some other time during the next six months.

Join other Zilker families on Saturday, Oct. 29, from 9 am to 1 pm, to give Little Zilker Park a

little TLC. We will mulch, cut back dead plants, and water trees and plants. This is a fun event that brings together our community for the benefit of this wonderful little neighborhood park next door to Zilker Elementary School. We'll have coffee and snacks for volunteers. Be sure to bring any garden tools you have (rakes, pruning shears, and wheelbarrows). Closed-toe shoes and hats are a good idea. Also, bring your own coffee cup and water bottles to help reduce waste. To help the planning team have a volunteer count, please RSVP at littlezilker@gmail.com.

In August 2010 we asked Emily King, our tree advisor with the Austin Parks Department, to help us evaluate our Little Zilker trees. In addition, she offered this advice on watering technique, which applies to all our trees, at home and in the parks:

"Be sure that the water is percolating deep. Think long slow drinks of water spread as much as possible around the root zone. Try to avoid only watering right at the base of the trunk. Use the drip line of the tree as a measuring tool for where to saturate soil (hopefully the roots go much further out than the drip line though). Aiming for every other week sounds like a reasonable goal. The trees will appreciate it! You do a great job keeping the trees well mulched, so that will also do a lot of good. If you are unsure if the water is really percolating you can use a hand trowel to dig down to see what is going on in the soil."



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#### Sustainable Zilker

TREE FOLKS has awarded Zilker Elementary a grant to plant 15 fruit and nut trees in the school's front lawn. This urban orchard will afford Zilker children an opportunity to nurture the trees as well as harvest and distribute the bounty. The planting day will be in January 2012. To raise funds for irrigation and rainwater collection tanks, the Zilker Sustainability Committee is holding a "Skill Share" lecture series the first Thursday of each month in the school cafeteria. The lectures will be open to the public (donation of \$5 is suggested for each participant). Kids are welcome! The Skill Share lectures in 2011 will be:

Thursday, Nov. 3, 6:30-8 pm: Bike to school and work: a primer and workshop on basic bicycle maintenance and safety.

Thursday, Dec. 1, 6:30-8 pm: Slow family holidays: a talk about keeping the holidays feeling fun and sane with Carrie Contey, PhD, and Bernadette Noll.

Another way to keep Zilker green: Water the plants in the garden beds along the sidewalk to the front entrance of the school. The plants in these beds were installed by volunteers last year and continue to hang in there in spite of the drought. The team that waters this important space also assists occasionally with plant selection, installation, and mulching. 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(Continued from page 1) permissive for absentee owners, essentially allowing them to operate motels in residential areas without the onsite management and regulation required of such businesses in commercially zoned areas. They note that some cities have left occasional short-term rentals unregulated but have restricted commercial STRs to areas with commercial zoning. This ANC resolution follows that logic, prohibiting commercial STRs in single-family neighborhoods.

#### Whereas

- 1. the Land Development Code's definition of permissible residential uses in single-family zoning districts states: "Residential uses include the occupancy of living accommodations on a nontransient basis"
- 2. the Board of Adjustment has determined that a transient residential rental use is one in which a property is rented for less than 10 consecutive days
- 3. there is a definable distinction between transient residential rental use in single-family zoning districts where the property is homesteaded and is the property owner's principal place of residence and transient residential rental use where the property is not homesteaded and not the owner's principal place of residence
- the latter category is defined as a Commercial Shortterm Rental (CSTR) for this resolution
- **5.** in the "City of Austin Guide to Land Use Standards," May 2008, the purpose of the single-family land use category includes to "preserve the land use pattern and future viability of existing neighborhoods" and to "protect residential neighborhoods from incompatible business or industry and the loss of existing housing"
- **6.** owners of single-family residential property rely on the Land Development Code as a covenant with the City of Austin, trusting our city to insure single-family use in single-family zoning
- 7. the constant flow of strangers and their vehicles undermines neighborhood crime watch efforts to know who is a legitimate resident and who is a potential criminal
- **8.** allowing CSTR use in single-family zoning districts, by definition not a long-term use, removes residential housing stock from our city and weakens enrollment in innercity elementary and middle schools
- **9.** it is city policy that the inner-city neighborhoods need to accept more residential density
- **10.** CSTRs threaten the meaning and purpose of Austin's family-oriented neighborhoods;

**Be** it resolved that the Austin Neighborhoods Council calls on the City Council of Austin to:

- 1. expand the definition of permissible residential uses in the Land Development Code to allow properties that are homesteaded and are the owner's principal residence to be rented on a transient, short-term basis for a maximum total of 30 days per calendar year.
- 2. enact an ordinance disallowing short-term residential use in single-family zoning districts as being a transient use. This ordinance must emphasize that STRs, unless

exempted by the property being homesteaded and the owner's principal place of residence, have always been in contradiction with the permissible residential uses allowed in single-family zoning districts. This proposed ordinance shall not grandfather properties that are operated in contradiction to the Land Development Code.

The Planning Commission recommendations, along with other background information and links, are posted on zilkerneighborhood.org.

#### Comprehensive Plan Resolution

A year ago the Austin Neighborhoods Council identified shortcomings in Austin's comprehensive planning process and asked the City Council to address those problems. By February 2011, the Planning Commission had offered assurances that the concerns would be addressed in the Working Group phase of the plan. City staff, however, continued to limit community input, to prevent working groups from dealing with neighborhood concerns, to refuse to provide essential data, and to ignore key points in the ANC call to action and many of the requests and recommendations of the Citizens Advisory Task Force.

The recently released draft plan does not address ten important issues faced by our community (see ancweb.org). This ANC resolution is similar to a proposal by Council Members Laura Morrison and Kathie Tovo in its reliance on the Task Force to fill certain gaps in the draft plan.

Whereas the city staff intends to rewrite the Land Development Code based on this comprehensive plan, and the draft plan contains many "Action Items" that are ill




defined and in many cases contain code words for eventual modifications to the LDC to remove or weaken many of the current protections for residents and neighborhoods in the code, the ANC calls on the City Council to address the concerns noted above by

- 1. Empowering the Citizens Advisory Task Force to take control of the planning process in order to address the plan's current shortcomings by allowing wider community input, obtaining critical planning data and information, providing the opportunity to fully vet alternative ideas and concepts for managing Austin's growth.
- 2. Directing the City Manager to rework the planning process schedule to allow more time to address the problems with the plan and to allow for more meaningful community input and evaluation of growth management land use options before determining a preferred growth concept map.
- 3. Delaying the Planning Commission review of the draft plan until the Citizens Advisory Task Force deems it appropriate to go forward and has garnered widespread neighborhood support.
- 4. Not taking any action to adopt the plan until these matters are resolved and the draft plan has gained widespread community support.

#### Charter Revision Resolutions

In August, the Austin City Council appointed a charter revision committee (CRC) to recommend plans for geographic representation in the council election system, among other charter amendments. The primary ANC resolution recommends "that the CRC and City Council place a charter amendment before the voters in 2012 establishing a minimum of eight geographic districts for the election of City Council members."

Seven charter resolutions are posted on ancweb.org, along with sample maps and Census data for 6, 8, and 10 district options, links to the CRC materials on the city's Web site, and other background information. *Lorraine Atherton*

Whatever you can do, I hope you will join your ZNA neighbors to make this a very happy holiday for several families in need this year. Let's give the next 12 years a running start!




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#### Election of 2012 ZNA Officers


