## Crossroads for Zilker Growth by ZNA President Dave Piper

IT'S OBVIOUS that Zilker neighborhood continues to undergo rapid change. The number of apartments and condos has more than doubled in the last 10 years. Small houses are being replaced by large houses. Rush-hour traffic on South Lamar is bad and the interior streets are absorbing the overflow.

I don't intend this message to be pessimistic; I'm just identifying a few things that could use a course correction or at least mitigation. For starters, we need reliable demographic data, such as job growth areas, access to jobs, housing costs vs. income, car ownership and population density. The City Council has directed our new City Manager to come up with a process for land development code changes. The zoning regulations and maps will dictate the size of all new and remodeled buildings, their use, and their compatibility to nearby residents.

Even with Cap Metro's long range plans and South Lamar's reconstruction (starting in a year or so), that boulevard's capacity to absorb growth is limited. It's the same for interior streets; most don't have sidewalks, and ongoing construction has left some of them a congested mess. The streets are the walkways in most of the neighborhood, and if excessive "dwelling units" are built in these areas, especially with inadequate parking, the narrow streets will become lined with cars. Pedestrians and vehicles will compete for the single travel lane. Insufficient retail parking also spills cars onto residential streets. That's why parking requirements are one of the most critical components of a zoning code.

In the 80's when the Hyatt Hotel went up on the riverbank, Austin created zoning to prevent more buildings from crowding the waterfront (the canyon effect) and to promote balance between urban development, park uses, and the shoreline. Today, that balance is in jeopardy on Butler Shores (an area that includes Zach Scott, Restaurant Row on Barton Springs Road, ball fields, Butler Pitch & Putt golf, and more than 1,300 multifamily residential units. It is also the primary gateway to Zilker Park, which needs a MasRegistered voters in Zilker precincts 332 and 340 increased 70%, from 4,274 in 2010 to 7,274 in 2018. With an estimated total population of 9,835, ZNA's density is now over 13 persons per acre.

ter Plan to manage access and parking, without cannibalizing parkland. There is also a proposal to construct a new Dougherty Arts Center to the west of Zach Scott theater. One building taller than 100 feet was approved in the area in 2013 (the Taco PUD), but never built. Another, an office tower, is proposed at the Schlotzsky's site. In my opinion, it's critical to keep buildings in Butler Shores no higher than the current limit of 60 feet. This would help retain the character of the area and create less congestion in an already bad stretch of South Lamar and Toomey Road.

The canyon effect applies to more than the river. Barton Springs Road and South Lamar could be hemmed in in the same way. Tall buildings not only obstruct open vistas, they adversely impact neighbors who live on the residential streets behind them. Whether you agree or disagree with this message, you should let the Mayor and our Council Member Ann Kitchen know what broad concepts you think should be incorporated into Austin's new

zoning regulations. The new effort is ramping up now. Communicating is easy to do via the internet or, better yet, by a phone call. It's a worthwhile adjunct to voting.

transit and hike and bike connections on South Lamar.
